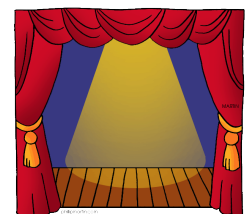
Student Attendance

Ask a Reading Specialist:

Dear Mrs. Howard,

My second grader is having trouble telling me about what he has read and he gets frustrated when I ask him about it. What should I do?

Sincerely, Perplexed Parent

Dear Perplexed Parent,

That's a great question. Start by checking to see if he is able to read the book accurately and independently. He should be able to successfully read at least 96% of the words on the page. If he can't, it is likely that there are too many challenging words in the text to properly make sense of it. He can hold onto the challenging book for the two of you to read together at bedtime. If he is able to read the book aloud successfully, you could talk about how reading is thinking.

Here are a few suggestions for building comprehension:

- Before reading, preview the book – What is the title? What is illustrated on the cover? Read the blurb about the book on the back of the book or book jacket.
- While reading, stop every few pages and think about, share, or write about what was just read.
- After finishing the book, talk about whether or not your son liked the book and why. There are many other elements to comprehension that are both literal (right there in the text) and inferential (figured out using clues from the text and background knowledge).

What I described above are just a few ways you can build comprehension skills while enjoying a good book! Another suggestion to build comprehension is to read a book together and model your thinking by “thinking aloud.” For example, while reading *Small Pig* by Arnold Lobel, you might stop a few times and predict, ask a question about the story, or re-read to figure out something confusing. You might say something like, “Mmm, I think the Small Pig is going to get stuck in the cement! I think the farmer and his wife will come to rescue him. Let's see if that is what happens.” Most importantly, make reading experiences with your son as positive and enjoyable as you can so that he will want to read and love to read!
